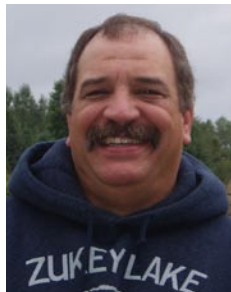

Pastor's Column

Last spring I read a great book by John Ortberg called "The Life You've Always Wanted." In his book, John talks about the ways in which spiritual disciplines help us to live a life like Christ. There was one example in his book that I had not even thought of as a spiritual discipline. It is the spiritual discipline of celebration. Celebration is something that God wants us to participate in. If you look at many of the festivals that

God commanded of the Israelites, they included a time of celebration. What an awesome God we have! We worship a God who loves to watch people fellowship together and to celebrate their accomplishments. The fact is we really don't celebrate enough. We're too busy charging on to the next challenge in life. It's a good idea that we stop occasionally and celebrate even the small victories.

I was so glad to hear that celebration is a spiritual discipline, because I just love a good celebration! Good food. Laughter. Hugs. Smiles. It was a good idea that together we celebrate the 10th Anniversary at Arise. And what fun it was!

There is another celebration coming up that, at first, you might not think of as a celebration—but it is! On Sunday, October 22, we will celebrate "One Step Of Faith: We're Building and Growing!" It's the day that we dedicate our financial pledge to God in 2007. You might be saying... "Celebration? That's not a celebration. I hate pledging time. It just makes me feel guilty. I hate talking about money!" I've heard plenty of other responses to stewardship time throughout my ministry.

But let me explain how it can and SHOULD be a celebration. There was a time in my life when I did not tithe. In fact, I didn't come remotely close to tithing. I plopped ten bucks a week in the offering plate (when I showed up) and felt like that was good enough. It represented less than 1% of my income. My faith in God at that point wasn't much of a priority. God didn't get my best. God got my leftovers.

Years later, after a failed marriage, the death of my mother, and a whole host of other problems, I found that my spiritual life really became important to me. I found myself going to church more. Praying more. I started attending a Bible study. It was a time in my life when

God became real. I really trusted that God would take care of me. It was only when I began turning toward God that my life improved.

Once I really believed that God would take care of me, something amazing happened. I found myself having no problem at all putting a little more of my dough into the offering plate. Ten bucks became twenty. Then forty. A little while later I learned from scripture that what God asks of me is 10% of my income. It seemed like a stretch, but slowly over a few years, I inched my way toward tithing. I found myself giving to God, not out of guilt, but out of thanksgiving. It felt good to give. Through my giving to the church I was helping to support great ministries both around town and around the world. The more I gave, the better I felt.

As my faith grew, so did my understanding and appreciation for tithing. Pledging time for me turned from a negative, guilt ridden experience into a joyful celebration.

In my 8 years of ministry, I have not found a single person who regretted stretching their faith and increasing their giving until they gave at a tithe or higher. With 100% confidence I can say that God really does bless those who give. Does that mean that people who tithe don't have problems in life? Of course not. But they have something even better. They have peace of mind. They have joy. It is the kind of joy that burrows deep in your soul. It's the kind of joy that nobody can take away from you.

For Shelley and me, Sunday October 22nd will indeed be a great day of celebration. We will celebrate the incredible goodness of God. We will celebrate this great church. We will eat great food. Delicious catered food. We will hug our friends from this church. We will laugh and smile together. We will gladly and joyfully give to God. Why? Because we could never give God enough back to express our appreciation for what God's already done for us. And we haven't even experienced the joy of heaven yet. We've got a lot more giving to do before we get there!

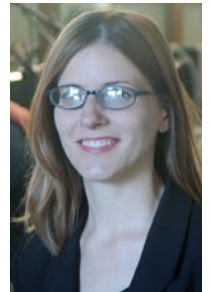

4. Fill your box with a variety of gifts: School supplies, small toys, hygiene items, hard candy...
5. Drop off your box at Arise services between Oct. 8th and Nov. 5th

Building at Arise

The Walls Are Up! As the photos show, a lot of work has been done and the push is on to have trusses in place by fall.

Drive by the barn at Arise Acres and you will notice some new changes. The roof has been removed and new walls are being erected for classrooms, a nursery and a multi-purpose worship space. These are all visible signs of steady progress in our effort to make a permanent home for Arise Church. The Arise Building Project is being completed on a volunteer and “build as we give” basis. Such a major undertaking requires a great deal of faith and hard work—Arise has demonstrated both. A dedicated core group of volunteers have been working regularly on Thursday evenings and Saturday mornings to accomplish what you see today. Thanks, team! Work on our church building will continue as funding and workers are available. This fall, additional masonry block work will be done, a new roof constructed (trusses, plywood sheeting and shingles), windows installed and exterior wood siding added to the addition and painted to prepare the building for winter and interior work. When asked what it was about Arise that drew her here, she answered without hesitation, "This church doesn't tell you that you

have to be a certain way to be a Christian. There are many different ways to being a Christian. I like that about Arise."

Emily's brother, John, had attended Arise for a time and knew some of the youth here, so Emily saw a few familiar faces when she arrived. Emily is a familiar face at Arise herself, being active in the Drama Team during worship. 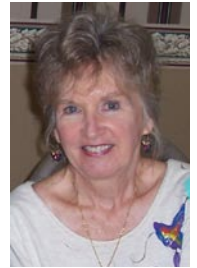

Greg recalls that his mother was a coordinator for the Head Start program when his parents lived in the Fenton area. While living in Saline, they had a book business, setting up book displays for early education conferences. Their donation of many children's books helped to start the lending library at the Saline church.

Carolyn has become active in Threads of Faith-- knitting prayer shawls and helping with sewing projects, as well as being invaluable at VBS this year. "I want to be useful

and supportive of people wherever I'm needed," she affirms. Some of her passions are University of Michigan football and genealogy, currently joining Cindy and Barb in this last pursuit. Her recent travels took her to Israel, where she stretched her comfort zone by traveling with a group of strangers on a tour of the Holy Land. Having to return to the States early, due to a respiratory illness, she says, "I never thought I could do it alone, but I found out that God was there with me all the way." It turned out to be a faith-building experience for her. Beth Plachta is her faith friend. We're glad you're here, Carolyn!

Jean Oxender transfers her associate membership from Dixboro UMC. She is a "snowbird," who spends her winters in Tucson, Ariz., where she is active at St. Mark's UMC. Having taken the Walk to Emmaus, Jean was looking for a church that provided a "4th Day Group"—an equivalent to the Arise L.I.F.E. Team experience. Since she lives in Ann Arbor she e-mailed a number of churches in the area, and only Pastor Doug McMunn responded, encouraging her to attend and connected her with Diane Gould, an Arise member and "neighbor" down the road. He assured Jean that "the Holy Spirit was present at Arise", so she ventured a ride with Diane and found the people at Arise to be "warm, friendly and so sincere." She thought to herself, "I can really fellowship with these Christians," and decided to join the church.



In spite of a 40 mile round trip from her home, Jean is active in Wednesday Night Bible Study and T.G.I.F. Sisters. This inspired her to provide Arise with a "golden bowl", which holds the prayer requests that are brought before God.

She was also an elementary school teacher for over 30 years and has written 18 children's books. Her husband and partner of 48 ½ years, Dale, passed away in Dec. '03, after a long career as a biochemistry professor at U of M and scientist at Park-Davis. They had the opportunity to travel to many fascinating locales around the world in that time. Arise: Ten Years of God's Grace



Did you know that there was a Methodist Church in the Village of Pinckney as early as 1854? That building stood until 1985. By that time, that congregation had merged with what is

now Community Congregational Church. It wasn't until 1976 that members of Brighton UMC envisioned a new congregation in the Pinckney area. From 1992 to 1995, members of local United Methodist congregations in the Detroit Conference contributed to the "Pass It On" Campaign—raising money for new church development. Arise was one of four "start up" churches that benefited from these generous efforts.

It is likely that many people attend church and never give a thought to how many years that congregation has been in existence or know anything about its early history. Founding members have always sacrificed their time, money and labor to make their churches a reality. The Arise congregation has shared in the adventure of being early church pioneers. People who have attended Arise services over the years located in a theater, a tent, a school cafeteria, and a barn have quickly become familiar with the concept of a young church and its unique joys and challenges. With God's grace and guidance, Arise will continue to be a welcoming sign of Christ's presence in the Pinckney area.



Blessings of Arise

I attended Arise for the first time at the barn right after we moved to Pinckney. Don was recuperating from open heart surgery, so I came by myself. It was spring time and cooler than I had anticipated. Dave Russell was standing by the door holding Jacob, then a young child. He greeted me warmly, introduced himself and then asked if I had brought a coat with me. I said no, but I could drive home to get one, if I needed to. He took Jacob and went to his car, brought back a blanket and wrapped it around me. He was so gracious; I always felt a strong connection to him after that. It is just one example of how people care for each other at Arise. —Jane Fuller

The first service we came to was an Easter service held in Jane Tasch Theater. They did a re-enactment of the Easter story that Sunday. We felt Arise
