He met Cheryl when they were in high school, where she attended the church that his father pastored in Fairgrove-- a small farming community in the Michigan thumb. Pastor's Column

Like many people, I am a person who had struggled with my faith because I didn't just want to take the claims of Christianity with blind faith, I wanted proof. I wanted to see concrete facts. Especially when the Bible asks me to believe things that are very difficult to believe.

Of all of the claims of the Bible, one claim surfaces larger than all the others; that Jesus rose from the dead. Its claim isn't that Jesus was resuscitated. Its claim is that he was resurrected. That he was totally and completely, undeniably dead, and then came back to life after being buried in a tomb.

Whenever I have the opportunity to talk with non-believers, I often start with discussions of the resurrection. Why? Because, the entire Christian faith hinges on the resurrection of Jesus. If there is no resurrection, there is no Christianity. Believe in the resurrection and everything else in the Bible is easy to believe because there is tremendous credibility in the words of someone who has beaten death.

In his book *Immortality—The Other Side of Death*, authors Gary Habermas and J.P. Moreland write, "Well over three hundred verses are concerned with the subject of Jesus' resurrection in the New Testament. We are told that this event is a sign for unbelievers (Matt. 12:38-40; John 20:24-29) as well as the answer for the believer's doubt (Luke 24:38-43). It serves as the guarantee that Jesus' teachings are true (Acts 2:22-24; 1 Cor. 15:12-20) and is the center of the gospel itself (Rom. 4:24-25, 10:9; 1 Cor. 15:1-4). Further, the resurrection is the impetus for evangelism (Matt. 28:18-20; Acts 10:39-43), the key indication of the believer's daily power to live the Christian life (Rom. 6:4-14, 8:9-11; Phil. 3:10) and the reason for the total commitment of our lives (Rom. 7:4; 1 Cor. 15:57-58). The resurrection even addresses the fear of death (John 11:25; 1 Cor. 15:54-58; Heb. 2:14-15) and is related to the second coming of Jesus (Acts 1:11; Rev. 1:7). Lastly, this event is a model of the Christian's resurrection from the dead (Acts 4:2; 1 Cor. 6:14; 1 Thess. 4:13-18) and provides a foretaste of heaven for the believer (Phil. 3:20-21; 1 Peter 1:3-5)."

I was a skeptic, but I'm not anymore. I took the time it takes to investigate the facts. And there is plenty of evidence to look at. Easter Sunday I'll be taking a look at four possible reactions to the claim that Jesus rose from the dead: investigate, ignore, reject, or believe. Where do

you stand? If you're in the reject category, can I convince you to at least investigate? If you have a non-believer in your life, can you encourage them to investigate?

The late attorney and British statesman Sir Lionel Luckhoo (of The Guinness Book of World Records fame for his unprecedented 245 consecutive defense murder trial acquittals) was asked to investigate the strength of the case for the resurrection. He looked into the facts for 1 ½ years. Upon finishing his investigation he wrote, "I have spent more than 42 years as a defense trial lawyer appearing in many parts of the world and am still in active practice. I have been fortunate to secure a number of successes in jury trials and I say unequivocally the evidence for the Resurrection of Jesus Christ is so overwhelming that it compels acceptance by proof which leaves absolutely no room for doubt."

What does the resurrection of Christ mean to me?
Everything!

I am looking forward to a deeply moving service on Maundy Thursday at 7:00 p.m. at Country Elementary, a Good Friday service at Community Congregational Church, and a gloriously joy filled Easter celebration at Country Elementary. There will be a breakfast at 9:00 a.m. followed by a gathering of the whole Arise Church family at one worship service (blended) at 10:00 a.m.

The Worship Committee wishes to thank everyone who participated in the Arise Music Survey. The decision to survey the congregation about the Arise music program was made when people began sharing their ideas and opinions with Pastor Don. The committee worked together to develop the survey questions and have been impressed with the response rate (41 surveys turned in) and by the sincere and honest feedback that was offered up by participants. We have been collating the responses and are now beginning to take action on what we learned based on common themes. These patterns will help the committee identify areas for improvement--ways to enhance the worship experience through music.



So far we can say that, based on your feedback, we have focused our energies on two broad areas that came up often in the surveys. The first is to find ways to increase the energy level as it pertains to music at the 11:00 a.m. worship service. The second is to increase the use of familiar songs in worship and to select music that is easy to sing. We are exploring the manner and frequency of how we introduce new music and how that might improve both familiarity and ease of sing-ability.

The Music Worship Survey contained a lot of information. While it indicated a general level of satisfaction with the worship music, it was clear that an opportunity exists for improvement. The most important point we would like you to know at this point is how much we appreciate your feedback. We will be working with both the Church Council and, where appropriate, the Staff Parish Relations Committee to implement the changes we need to make in order to ensure our worship experience has as much meaning and impact as possible in developing disciples of Jesus Christ.

The action plan resulting from this survey will address the Council's request for committees and L.I.F.E. teams to identify ways we can all help to contribute to one of our primary objectives for 2008--promoting excellence in worship. The Arise Cross: How it Came to Be

This is the story of how the cross at Arise Acres came to be. First, you know the story of Jesus and the cross. Different cross and story, same meaning. In 1958 the local boy scouts planted hundreds of evergreen trees in different varieties on approximately 40 acres in Gregory. Brenda and I purchased 12 of those acres about 20 years ago with mainly white pine in that area (our state tree). Over the years they have grown very well to approximately 50-60 feet tall.

One year a storm came through and snapped two of the trees in half--the upper half resting very high on the tree canopy next to them. For safety reasons, I cut down the broken trees.

Wondering what I could do with the logs, I decided to make some beams. I have some interest in building a post and beam building some day. So, I called two friends to help retrieve the logs from the woods. We dragged them with a four-wheel drive A.T.V. motorcycle over to the house. For traction one guy sat on the handlebars and the other two sat on the seat. We three grown men were quite a sight.

Using a chain saw, I cut the logs to 8"x8" square timbers. Then I placed the timbers in my garage to dry. Not finding a use for them, I left the logs sit in the garage for about 3 years.

Sometime in the process our family started attending Arise church. We joined one of the L.I.F.E. Teams called Wednesday Night Bible Study. I joined when it first started. Ron Fike, the team leader, asked the group, "How can we help Arise church?" The idea of building a cross for Arise Acres came to mind, but I didn't want to go through the unfamiliar process to have it approved. Ron and the group said, "Build it, we're sure they will like it." So I did.

Transporting it was interesting. The cross is approximately 14 feet long and 6 feet wide.

Tony and I placed this cross in the back of my Chevy S-10 pickup truck. Driving through the town of Gregory and Hell, we had a lot of funny looks by people in their cars and walking by. We were thinking the people probably thought we were big into religious symbolism... or just crazy. We had a good laugh during the whole drive over.



We placed the cross in the barn and asked Tom Terhune to find out if it was all right to erect it on the property. Tom got approval and said, "Go ahead and put it up." My next question was where to place it. Tom said, "They didn't say, so I guess you decide." The first thing I thought of was on the mount.

The next day Tony and I set out to erect the cross on the hill. All of the above-mentioned people made the cross happen. I believe it was with Divine guidance.
